# Our Story

Ingenuity and collective power are long-standing hallmarks of Black giving in the Richmond region, dating back to the city's beginning. Yet stories and contributions of Black philanthropists have not been widely told or celebrated – until now.

Over the past decade, Ujima Legacy Fund and SisterFund (giving circles for Black men and women respectively) emerged as important additions to the region's Black giving landscape. Not only have they infused new resources into the community each year, but they also represent a passionate and influential set of leaders who are eager to share their collective experience, voice, and resources to elevate Black philanthropy locally. Most notably, their combined leadership worked in partnership with the Community Foundation to shepherd the research and publication of the Giving Black: Greater Richmond report and establish the Amandla Fund for Economic and Racial Justice.



Not only did the Giving Black report reveal that local Black donors ranked economic equity as the most important and overlooked social issue, but also recommended that the broader philanthropic community promote and involve Black donors in increasing economic equity and addressing issues that disproportionately affect Black people. If the Giving Black study is a clear and urgent call to action, the Amandla Fund is our thoughtful and transformative response.

The Fund derives its name from the Nguni word for "power and strength" and was a popular rallying cry in the days of resistance against apartheid, used by the African National Congress and its allies in South Africa.

And now we have a chance, as a community, to rectify some of the harms of past policies and serve as a model of what can be when America lives up to its aspirations.

Ujima Legacy Fund (Ujima), a Black men's giving circle, was established to support organizations empowering Black youth through education.



## > 2015

SisterFund, a Black women's giving circle, was founded to support nonprofits empowering Black women and girls in our region.



## >> 2019

Ujima, SisterFund and the Community Foundation launched the two-year Giving Black®: Greater Richmond study to take a deeper dive into the trends and impacts of Black philanthropy in central Virginia.

The Community Foundation named Stephanie Glenn as its first Vice President of Diversity and Engagement.

The Amandla Fund for Economic and Racial Justice was launched.



### **2021**

At the end of the strategic planning process, the Amandla Fund solidified its initial focus on increasing Black homeownership and expanding Black nonprofit leadership in the region.

# >> Priority #1

## Increase Black Homeownership

**Sustainable homeownership** has been proven to be a highly effective route to building wealth and intergenerational economic mobility. The Amandla Fund supports efforts to increase homeownership opportunities for Black families.

# > Priority #2

## Expand Black Leadership

**Supporting Black-led and Black-serving organizations\*** offers a proven path to increasing equity and opening opportunities for employment. The Amandla Fund supports initiatives to train, mentor, and increase the number of African Americans in nonprofit leadership roles.

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
